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Our mission

is to engage the UIC campus and local communities to deepen understanding of the diverse cultural heritages and identities of Latinxs, issues affecting their lives, and creative solutions they are using to improve community life.



During the 2017-2018 academic year, the Rafael Cintrón Ortiz Latino Cultural Center (LCC) continued flourishing as a hub of creativity and engaged learning. Staff worked to increase understanding of social and environmental issues affecting the lives of Latinxs and Latin Americans while making connections across diverse communities and identities.

This year's LCC highlights include expansion of the Arts-Based Civic Dialogues & Tours Initiative, implementation of the ARTivism series, and involvement in the L@s GANAS Program. The Dialogues and Tours attended by UIC students connected course material to community challenges and solutions through themes like Migration & Immigration and Environmental & Climate Justice. The ARTivism series centered on creative practices to generate specific actions such as a postcard campaign in support of DACA and TPS (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals and Temporary Protected Status) and the creation of a collective artwork in support of "Rescue, Relief, and Rebuild" of

Puerto Rico. The collective art piece was made up of twelve individual paintings, created by UIC students, which were auctioned during the "Hurricane Maria and the Crisis of Colonialism" Symposium at UIC. In the L@s GANAS Program, created through a Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI) STEM grant from the US Department of Education, the LCC designed and facilitated a series of dialogues that connected science and Latin American heritages to help students shape their identity as Latinx scientists.

Public programs continued strong and relevant with *Zona Abierta* (Open Zone), Civic Cinema, *Noche de Poetas* (Poetry Night), and Special Programs such as the 26th annual UIC Chicago Latino Film Festival and the 2nd annual Earth Week celebration. These programs brought diverse people together to advance understanding of local/global issues and action ideas that can advance positive change, especially in the lives of undocumented immigrants and other marginalized communities. The LCC is one of seven Centers for Cultural Understanding and Social Change (CCUSC) under the Office of Diversity in Academic Affairs. The CCUSC continued to strengthen its presence on campus through collaborative programing such as the UIC Heritage Garden Internship Program, Reimagining Masculinities Initiative, and a year-long series that focused on mental health called "Spaces for Wellness."

The LCC received national recognition through a two-year project with the Humanities Action Lab and in collaboration with the UIC Museum & Exhibition (MUSE) Program, Jane Addams Hull-House Museum, and community partner Alianza Americas.

Conference presentations included "Cities, Climate, & Migration" at the Zolberg Institute on Migration and Mobility, and "Supporting STEM Student Success with Cultural Dialogue" at Midwest HSI Conference.
